

### Oakstead MASTER HOA by Christopher Ayoub



For the Oakstead HOA article this month, I am going to address just two very important issues in the hope that the message, in a shorter narrative, will get the focus they require. One deals with the enforcement of the covenants and design standards contained in our legal documents,

and the other involves homeowner involvement to do the required work of the Association.

Most every exterior modification or project to your home and property, requires approval from the HOA. A list of the projects can be found in both the Declaration of Covenants and Design Review Criteria Document. Prior to undertaking a project, homeowners must fill out an application, listing the type of work being done, the scope and design of the project, materials, supplies and equipment. The information required will of course depend on the project so, if for instance, a permit from the County is needed, a copy should be included with the application. Depending on the type of work, there are 3 different types of applications. One for tree removal, one for exterior painting and the final one for all other projects. These can be found on the myoakstead.com website under the Oakstead HOA tab. Once on that page, scroll down to the Design Review Board Documents. Please do not do an exterior modification project that requires approval. Too often

homeowners are burden with unnecessary costs and fines because they failed to follow the rules. The process is simple and the turnaround time is usually within a couple of weeks, provided your project meets the mandated design standards. Questions about the application can be either address by our representatives from Associa, Board Members or Members of the Design Review Board Committee.

The second topic I would mention, deals with community involvement. In a community the size of Oakstead, the HOA Board should have at least 5 members. At this point, and while we have had 3 recent additions, there are 2 spots that will need to be filled in the coming months. Additionally, we have a couple committees that need positions filled, including the DRB Committee mentioned in the above paragraph. The Board meets just once a month in the evening for a couple hours and the much of the committee work is done online. I have been doing this for the past 10 years and it has provided me the opportunity to meet many of fellow neighbors and homeowners. Winston Churchill was quoted as saying, "We make a living by what we get. We make a life by what we give." I would highly recommend to give it a try.

As a reminder, the HOA meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of each month at the Oakstead Clubhouse. Meetings begin at 7:00 pm. As always, we look forward to seeing new faces in the audience.

### Parking Across the Sidewalk

Pasco County has a law that states no overnight street parking is permitted. Residents want to know why is there no parking in the street? The answer is emergency vehicles can not get through a street with cars parked on it. Right or wrong that is the law. So now residents park in their driveways and across the sidewalks which creates more problems for This makes it hazardous for residents. people to walk into the street in order to get around cars that are jutting out of the driveways. Our management company gets numerous complaints each week about cars blocking the sidewalk. Keeping the sidewalks clear can prevent unwanted and unnecessary accidents. The management company advises the residents to take a picture of the vehicle blocking the driveway with the address and send it to the management company. As a result, for not upholding a Tanglewylde by-law a violation will be issued to the offender. Violators complain that they have no place to park. They comment that it is only at night that they park across the driveway because they leave in the morning. Sorry, there is no blocking the sidewalks, no overnight parking in the streets or no parking on the grass.

### **Budget Time Again**

It is time to look into the future and create a plan for rebuilding our reserves. Just like when we started working on building our reserves the first-time. We projected what the cost of roofing material and the cost of paint would be in order to have an adequate budget to cover the costs. We have been through the process once and it should be easier to do this time. We really did not do too badly on our past budget only falling slightly short on the cost of roofing. We successfully completed the project without having to impose a special assessment. After the completion of the roofing job, I was asked, "What do we do with the money now that the roofing project is complete"? To respond to the question, we start rebuilding the funds for the future roof replacement in 15 years.

The painting project is working well. As the monthly maintenance money comes in, it is going out to pay for the villas that have been repainted. Just as the roofing project, it is a slow but steady process as the money comes in, payment for the next group of painted villas is sent out.


Tanglewylde's landscapers are constantly changing. Since Tanglewylde was formed, we have had seven or eight different landscapers. The reasons are varied between companies being bought out, or we weren't satisfied with the work they were doing and letting them go to the company advising us they are opting out of their contract.

### Low Water in Ponds

For new residents I like to fill you in on why our ponds are so low. This is our dry season, and soon our rainy season will begin. Most times you will see the dark clouds in the east and between 4 to 7 pm it will rain. The weatherman will predict that

we have a 50/50 chance of rain. If it doesn't rain, we fell

into the dry side of the 50/50. We can get one to three inches of rain in a rain fall however I like to see the ponds low so if we get a hurricane, there is a place to put all the rainwater. By the end of the summer, the ponds will be full, and the conservation areas will also be full of the extra rainwater flowing toward the gulf.



### **Fact of the Month**

How do you know if your irrigation is working? First, we can only water twice a week (look in the newsletter for your scheduled days to water). In Tanglewylde, the landscaper sets the irrigation clocks for watering. They set the days and set the zones 1- 4 to water for ten minutes a zone. You can check to see if your irrigation is working by placing a plate on the lawn before you go to bed and if you have water in the dish in the morning your irrigation is working, or you might notice water stains on your vehicle if it was parked in your driveway. If your irrigation system is not working properly, please contact our Management Company. Rizzetta will prepare a work order for repairs and forward it to the landscaper.

### Note from BOARD SUPERVISOR by Norm Keith



Brazilian pepper, crazy ants, fire ants, army worms, mole crickets, chiggers, ticks, mosquitoes, shad flies, kudzu vines, poison ivy, poison sumac, creeping Charlie weeds, and probably many more nuisance plants cause many Florida residents problems with rashes, and severe allergies. Oakstead has its share of all of these irritants and pests. The University of Florida Agricultural Department constantly researches ways to remedy all of the above. A few have been effectively dealt

with through eradication and control programs.

Around 1846 an invasive weed called the Brazilian pepper plant was introduced into Florida. It was considered desirable because of its beautiful red berries. In 1945 A man named Dr. Stone started to cultivate Brazilian pepper plants and recommended that they be planted in every yard. He called them Christmas holly. These plants thrived in our climate and today Florida has over 700,000 acres of Brazilian pepper plants are growing uncontrolled in every part of the state.

In actuality poison ivy and poison sumac plants are more dangerous

than Brazilian peppers. Research is being done on the medicinal qualities of Brazilian pepper berries. They may cure urinary tract infections, and might be used as an antiseptic. Some people grind and dry the berries and use them as a pepper flavored spice on fish. Not me!

The best private property landscape Brazilian pepper control method is to trim the branches back to your property line and to pull up the new plants. They grow most rapidly from September - October. The plants germinate from the berries. Extremely toxic chemicals are required to kills the trees and should be left to the professionals. It is not possible for the Community Development District to eliminate the numerous acres of Brazilian Pepper trees growing in our conservation areas. To do so would clear the conservation areas of vegetation which the South West Water Management District will not allow.

Private property owners in Oakstead are required by Oakstead Covenants to maintain their landscaping from front to rear. We all agreed to abide by these covenants as property owners. The District is not approaching this problem from a negative standpoint but is simply being realistic in its solution.

Remember, Oakstead is a truly nice place to live and by working as a team we can make it even better.



**Basic Disaster Supplies Kit** 

To assemble your kit store items in airtight plastic bags and put your entire disaster supplies kit in one or two easy-to-carry containers such as plastic bins or a duffel bag.

A basic emergency supply kit could include the following recommended items:

- \* Water (one gallon per person per day for several days, for drinking and sanitation)
- \* Food (at least a several-day supply of non-perishable food)
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
- \* Flashlight, First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- \* Whistle (to signal for help)
- \* Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
- \* Plastic sheeting and duct tape (to shelter in place)
- \* Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
- \* Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
- \* Manual can opener (for food)
- \* Local maps
- \* Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery
