"Thank goodness for the Tocobagans"

Tampa Bay has been able to avoid hurricanes for a long time and many people attribute that to a blessing that came from the **Tocobaga Tribe**. The last hurricane to hit the Tampa Bay area in da direct hit was in 1921. Thank goodness for the Tocobagans Natiive Indians who performed sacred prays to keep the area safe. After seeing what our neighbors down south have been hit with, I am beginning to believe in the Indian prayers.

The Tocobagans' village capital was where Safety Harbor is today, but their mounds, both sacred and burial, are found from the Gandy Bridge along the peninsula to the Gulf Coast.

With Oakstead being built on Indian praying

grounds, I thought you would enjoy this article (below) I found written by MB (?).

Native American Mound Site at Philippe



The Tocabaga tribe is estimated to have lived on the site of Philippe Park in Oldsmar/ Safety Harbor area beginning around 900 A.D. They built a large ceremonial mound which still stands at the park, making it the largest surviving mound in the region. A village of 400 to 2500

Native Americans lived on the site, using bows and spears as well as tools fashioned from bones. Spanish explorers who arrived in the 1800s described them as a tall, strong people. Today the mound has a concrete path leading to its top with winding stairways descending the sides facing the bay. You will find signs posted at the park that describe the history of the native village more completely.

For more information, travel just a few miles north to Safety Harbor where you will find the Safety Harbor Museum. The museum has history dioramas for kids and a set of books that describe the history of Philippe Park, the surrounding area, and the state of Florida.

As we were reviewing the story ideas submitted by our fellow villagers, the theme of gratitude seemed to be worth exploring. According to Psychology Today, there are 7 scientifically proven benefits of gratitude.

According to a 2014 study published in Emotion, thanking a new acquaintance makes them more likely to pursue an ongoing relationship. Appreciation can help us win new friends. If you haven't done so already, make sure that "thank you" is part of your every day vocabulary. Recognizing another person's contributions can lead to new opportunities.

Believe it or not, Grateful people experience fewer aches and pains. According to a 2012 article published in Personality and Individual Differences, grateful people are more likely to take care of They exercise more often and schedule regular themselves. checkups.

We tend to get what we give and gratitude helps reduce negative feelings of envy, frustration, regret, and resentment. Robert Emmons, a researcher, has established a link between gratitude and happiness and a reduction in depression.

Gratitude reduces aggression and enhances empathy. A 2012 study by the University of Kentucky revealed that participants that ranked higher on gratitude scales were less likely to retaliate against others. They experienced more sensitivity and empathy towards others and a decreased desire to seek revenge.

Do you need a better night's sleep? Try jotting down a few grateful sentiments before retiring for the night. A 2011 study published in Applied Psychology: Health and Well-Being reported that keeping a Gratitude Journal improves sleep.

When you feel good about yourself, you tend to perform better. Gratitude improves self-esteem. According to a 2014 study published in Journal of Applied Sports Psychology, gratitude improves athletes' self-esteem. Other research suggests that rather than becoming resentful of those that are well off, grateful people are able to appreciate the accomplishments of others.

For years, studies have shown that gratitude reduces stress and helps one overcome trauma. Being thankful for what we have, even in the worst of times, fosters resilience.

Every day can be Thanksgiving Day when one develops an "attitude of gratitude". We wish you and those that you love a blessed Thanksgiving.

Fish Kill

A fish kill is common this time of year and that is because of the temperature turning cooler. This is our time of year when cool fronts finally make it this far south with nighttime temperatures dropping into the fifties and sixties causing the top layer of the water of our ponds to cool off. During the summer, the water temperature can get into the nineties but in the fall the top layer cools off creating a block that does not allow oxygen into the lower warmer level. Since these ponds are not natural ponds (they are manmade), there is no real water currents to mix the warm water with the cooler water.

At first, the smaller fish die and float to the top and the birds have a ball waiting for the breeze to blow the dead fish to the edges of

the ponds. At first it is the small fish that die but as the temperature drops further down into the thirties and forties bigger fish die from lack of oxygen and they float up to the surface. It is all part of nature and within a week between the gators feeding and the birds feasting it is all cleaned up.

This event is not done by landscapers or the pond maintenance company it is a natural occurrence. It doesn't happen every year only when the temperature gets cooler or cold weather comes to town.

Crossing The Streets

Crossing the streets is not an easy task. With all the traffic and people looking at their phones, in a rush to get the kids to school whatever it is, watch out! When going for a walk you may have the right of way when crossing the road but being hit by a car or truck negates the right of

way. Look to left then the right and then look again left and right before crossing the road.

Walking at night you should wear light colored clothing or wear a reflective vest and carry a flashlight. People like to listen to music, but these ear buds block out the sounds that warn you of danger. Please be careful and always be aware of your surroundings.

As I spoke during the last newsletter, the HOA is working to make things better for our community. To do that, there are some things that you can do to help. First, please take the time to read the community design standards and covenants. These are our

regulating documents and guide the operations of the HOA and can be found on the HOA website (www.myoakstead.com). In them, you'll find everything from the composition of the HOA board to the design standards. They outline what kind of structures you can and can't have (sheds, pergolas, fences, pools, etc) as well as the requirements of what to do when you decide to make changes to the exterior appearance of your home (painting, changing windows, adjusting landscaping, etc). These documents help us to maintain the standard that our community has and keep things orderly.

With that said, however, these documents are nearly 20 years old and they remain largely unchanged since they were

established. Back then, the color choices for homes, the size of our cars, the usefulness of our garages, and our family compositions were different.

Unfortunately, we need nearly 70% of all property owners to vote to make changes. I know at recent meetings the topic of storage sheds has arisen. While everyone has their own opinions about them, the fact of the matter is that many of our

residents could benefit from the use of a small storage shed to house our lawn and garden equipment, children's yard toys, etc. Many of us have moved from other areas around the country and we're finding that we used our basements as storage and now in Florida, that has become our garage. This is just one example of a regulation we have that the HOA is bound by our documents to enforce. If everyone takes the time to read our documents and make notations about things they'd like to see changed, the HOA board can compile a list of the common trends and we can add it to our annual homeowners meeting for a vote, or we can schedule a special meeting to address the requested issue(s). If we can get at least 70% of our residents to either come to the meeting or submit a proxy form, we can make changes to our documents to bring them up to current standards. It's a monumental task, however with YOUR help, we can do it!
