

Happy Fall Neighbors! This month's edition of the HOA news will be slightly different than previous months. By the time you read



this, will have had initial budget meeting, and we'll be poised to host our Annual Meeting/ Budget Finaliza-

tion. The HOA board has some exciting things coming up in the next year as well. We've gotten feedback from the community about what you'd like to see changed with our bylaws, and we're working to get the language put together and a voting mechanism in place. We'll be looking for YOUR help to make this work, so please keep your eyes peeled for updated information. We're also getting quotes to revamp our website and make it more user-friendly. However, the #1 place to get the latest and greatest information is the Greenacre G360 portal (www.g360.greenacre.com). If you haven't

registered yet, PLEASE do so. At our last meeting we highlighted that only 470 residents had registered. If you plan to make changes to your property, want to see if you have any violations, or pay your bill, THIS is where you can do it the easiest. Take the 30 seconds it takes to register and get it done.

As you may have noticed, there are lots of beautification things happening around our community. Thanks to the diligence of Greenacre Properties Inc, we're seeing our neighbors take better care of their properties. We do this through the violation process, which can lead to fines. The board DOES NOT want to see ANYONE get a fine. Please comply with the rules in a timely manner so we can all live cohesively and without animosity. If you are unfortunate enough to get a fine, please pay it quickly. The bills only get bigger when you don't.

At the request of the clubhouse staff, below is the information for the mailbox paint colors. To my knowledge, nothing has changed, but I have heard there is some confusion. The only real change to the mailbox regulations is that we now allow for PVC replacement posts. Again, all this information is available on the G360 portal.

Tanglewylde Homeowners are encouraged to register for the Association Portal at www.rizzetta.com if you have not already done so. The Association Portal provides access to your account information as well as documents, community architectural guidelines and alteration applications. Work orders can also be submitted through the Portal. Please take a moment to register using the following steps. Go www.rizzetta.com. select Association Portal at the upper center of the page. Once on the portal page, please select sign up. You do not need a registration key or account number to register. Click on "I don't have a portal key or account number." Fill in your email, name, phone, property address and association. You do not need an account number. Then select "I'm not a robot" and Sign Up. You will receive an email within 48 business hours with your log in credentials.

Grass

We asked our landscaper to come out and assess the dead spots in our lawns to see if we have an insect infestation or a fungus problem. The Tanglewylde HOA wants to ascertain how much it would cost to treat and

replace the dead areas. Another matter which has to be investigated is the irrigation systems to be sure that the lawns are being watered properly and to find out if the irrigation heads are functional.

Pasco County has so many new communities being built, and it seems like they all are installing reclaimed water. This causes a shortage of reclaimed water and when the reclaimed water runs out that's it for the day. It is mandatory that homeowners must wait until their next assigned watering day to water their lawns. Regardless of your watering day, no watering is permitted between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Proper Pet Waste Disposal

Pasco County is asking pet owners to do their part by collecting their pets' waste and properly disposing of it. When pet waste is left on the ground, stormwater and irrigation runoff carries the bacteria and nutrients into the waterways. This waste runoff contributes to algae blooms and unhealthy conditions for fish and wildlife. Polluted waters are also unsafe for swimming and recreation, forcing our beaches to close.

Help keep Pasco County waterways clean by disposing of your pet waste in the trash.

I do my walking at night and walk through Tanglewylde. It is quiet and peaceful, and the streets are no longer hot from being baked by the sun all day. I have seen deer, racoons and a few rabbits. One night I made a mistake and left my garage door open and upon my return found a snake coming out of my garage. One night recently while I was out for my walk, I noticed that there were four or five garage doors open and this made me wonder what critters might be getting into these garages. In the past I have received calls about alligators under cars, snakes hiding in boxes, etc. So, what I am asking everybody is to close their garage doors at night because you don't need a surprise greeting you in the morning.

Your Weymouth Board of Directors has been hard at work reviewing reserve studies (roadmaps for communities to plan how much money should be set aside in our reserve fund to pay for upcoming/future capital expenses such as villa painting, roof replacements, etc.). A 2021 Reserve Study identified a funding gap and noted that "a potential deficit in reserves might occur by 2030" (a copy can be found at https:// g360.greenacre.com in the Financials folder). The 2021 Reserve Advisors' recommendation was to increase the 2022 monthly reserve contribution an additional \$120.69 monthly. This was rejected and instead, the maximum 5% increase from \$180 to \$189 was enacted. The results of the new 2023 reserve study requested by your current Board also confirmed a funding gap and Reserve Advisors recommended a 2024 monthly HOA fee increase of approximately 23.6% to \$233.41. However, the Board cannot raise the monthly assessment more than 5%

without a community vote. Given that only 24 residents attended the September Annual Meeting, it is unlikely that a community vote would produce both a quorum and a yes vote.

So, the Board went back and stripped the operating account of every dollar that was not earning interest and is not essential to operating expenses to interest bearing CD's. This action closed part of the gap. In addition, if the community votes to double the maximum increase in assessments in the future from 5% to 10%, which is the standard in our sister community, the reserve funding will be adequate for approximately the next 23 years. Long story short, the good news is that your 2024 HOA fee assessment is only going to increase 5% to \$198.45 a month.

The first of our fully funded capital improvements will start in 2024. The paint committee has been busy working with Sherwin Williams experts to provide our community with new exterior color

scheme options that will enhance Weymouth's overall curb appeal. It won't

be long before the community will be able to preview and vote on their favorites. I'm excited!

Finally, the wall painting project on Haskell Place and Simonton Court is complete. All those that chose to participate in the project have had their section of the wall painted. This project is an example of what when parties seek to understand the other party's perspective and then works together to achieve common goals. Our friends in Congress could learn from our CDD, our HOA and our residents about compromise and accomplishing goals.

This month we are reminded to be thankful. With a positive attitude, there is so much to be thankful for in our community. I sincerely hope that this holiday season brings you closer to the ones you love.
