
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A Note from Nancy

Although the clubhouse was closed, we have been hard at work. Some of the projects that we have taken on this year are: Community wall painting, sidewalk grinding and replaced due to trip hazards, a new alarm system, new roof on clubhouse new basketball hoops and nets, new benches around the community, new shade screens around pool deck, we fixed all the rotten wood on the linear path bridges, new storage shed, the gates were repaired and repainted, and the Strathmore gate house repaired and painted. There are a few projects that we are still working on. The playground has not been shut down due to Covid-19, it was shut down because the bolts and hinges were rotting, and it became dangerous for our children to play on. Unfortunately, the parts had to come out of China and by the time China opened up California was shut down to receive the products. We also added in some new rockers and replaced the decaying toddler playground. So far, the kids are loving the new updates. The board has decided to install security cameras at the gates. Since the cameras have been installed our repairs due to gate smashers has gone down by 98% saving the community thousands of dollars. Last year we spent close to \$40,000. In gate repairs and over \$100,000. In claims that the gates closed on people's cars. The cameras have also solved crimes that have The last large project the board will be been committed. working on is new gate motors and new digital gate phones. Gate motors are usually good for 8 to 10 years and we are coming up on 13 years on our current motors. The replacement will take place over the next few months.

The fingerprint system is now gone, and a new facial recognition system is in place. The new system will guarantee us 98% entry rather than the 60% we were getting. We now have the option of facial entry or fingerprint entry. If you have some time, please stop by the clubhouse as we have to enter everyone into the new system.

We wish all our residents and their loved one's health, strength and resilience at this time, and we thank you for all your continued support.

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Oakstead HOA

As 2020 comes to a close, we can all likely take comfort in knowing that we will soon be through what has been a most difficult, challenging and very troubling year. Since the beginning of the pandemic, and given the dramatic change to our daily routines, your HOA has adjusted the day-to-day oversight focus to incorporate the impact on our community. Covenant enforcement efforts were primarily focused on maintenance related items that needed to be immediately addressed and non-maintenance items that represented an unsafe or unacceptable situation. Additionally, and given the significant increase in exterior modification applications to the Design Review Board, as many of us took the time at home to address some outside projects, a great deal of time and effort was needed to maintain a quick and accurate approval process.

Several years back, the HOA instituted a Monthly Maintenance Focus that was designed in part to provide homeowners with a planning tool to address the many requisite maintenance projects required by the Declaration of Covenants. Each month, a specific item would be inspected for compliance and violation letters would be issued as a reminder to the homeowner. Each maintenance item would be inspected twice a year, which provides a reasonable time structure for both the HOA and homeowner. In this way, the homeowner can be proactive in maintaining their property and the HOA can focus enforcement action on those properties that need immediate attention. As a reminder, violations for maintenance items have a two-letter policy. The first letter is a friendly reminder providing a 21-day cure period. If not resolved in that period, a second letter is sent that provides 10 days, which if not addressed will result in a possible fine. In an effort to address the many non-maintenance covenants contained in our legal documents, the Board instituted a violation policy that provides notification of a violation. It is expected that these types of violations, (parking related, improper equipment storage, etc.), will be immediately addressed and that any future observations will receive a fine for each occurrence. It is important to mention that it is not the Board's intent to issue fines. Rather it is our goal to have all members of the HOA comply with the rules that we are all legally obligated to follow. Remember, there are corrective actions that we can take as a community to change components of the Declaration of Covenants that we believe are outdated or unnecessary. However, that takes a 75% majority vote to make those changes and history has told us that without significant participation of membership, it can't be accomplished. Complaining doesn't affect change, only involvement does. There a few very important reminders and notifications:

- The Florida State Troopers will be driving through each Village on a random basis and will be ticketing vehicles that are illegally parked on the street. Overnight street parking is strictly prohibited and can be a serious problem for emergency response vehicle access to our community.
- The HOA will be increasing enforcement efforts to get control of Vehicles that are blocking the sidewalks. The HOA has received numerous safety related complaints from residents and we need everyone comply with this issue.
- The majority of exterior modification projects requires approval from the HOA. Design Review Board applications are available online at myoakstead.com. Remember to include all supporting documentation with the application and if the project requires a Pasco County permit, a copy needs to be included. Failure to receive approval for an exterior project could result in unnecessary costs and fines to the homeowner. Additionally, it is critical that all conditions attached to the approval of a project are applied.
- If you have a street side oak tree bordering your property, it is your responsibility to maintain the tree. Pasco County Fire Marshall issued a notice of violation to the HOA for a number of trees that fell below the 14-foot minimum street height requirement. Please make sure to keep your tree trimmed to the 14-foot standard for the portion over the street and a 7-foot standard for the portion over the sidewalk.
- As per the Declaration of Covenants, the only flags allowed to be flown are the American Flag, State Flag of Florida, Flags of the Military branches and POW /MIA Flags. All other flags are not allowed and will be subject to enforcement action.
- <u>Myoakstead.com</u> is the official website for the Oakstead HOA. Please familiarize yourself with this site as it contains all the important documents, forms and helpful informational resources.

The HOA is a volunteer organization that is required by State Law to oversee the responsibilities contained in the legal documents that define Oakstead as a deed restricted community. Without volunteers willing to give their time and energy to the process, the State would take over this function and the cost to our community would be significant. We need people to step forward and be part of this effort.







Targeted Monthly Violations

Month	Areas that need your attention
January	Trees trimmed. Live Oaks trimmed to 7 ft. ground clearance and dead palm fronds removed.
February	Driveways, sidewalks and gutters cleaned.
March	Landscaping/Sod. Replace dead and diseased sod and landscape plantings. No plantings should obstruct walkways of sightlines at intersections
April	Fences, repaired and cleaned
May	Exterior cleaning and/or painting of house. Painting requires DRB approval.
June	Mailboxes- repair or replace. Street numbers on house are clearly visible.
July	Trees trimmed. Live Oaks trimmed to 7 ft. height clearance and dead palm fronds removed.
August	Landscaping/Sod. Replace dead sod and landscape plantings. No plantings should obstruct walkways of sightlines at intersections
September	Exterior cleaning and/or painting of house. Painting requires DRB approval.
October	Clean Roofs and make repairs as needed.

CAMERAS ADDED TO VILLAGE

I have been asked by village residents why the cameras were installed within the last few months. The reason why the CDD installed cameras on the villages was to protect the investment of straightening and repairing the gates from years of gate crashing and repairing the hinges. While we had the gates off, the gates were repainted and rehung, but that did not stop cars and trucks from pushing the gates open and cars driving out and in the wrong gate creating a danger of an accident. New gate operators and call boxes will be installed within the next few months on all village entrances. Repairs on the old gate operators are happening more frequent and parts are becoming more expensive. So, to protect the new equipment, cameras were installed. Vandalizing from people who do not want the gates closed damage the call boxes. It has become more frequent, costing the community thousands of dollars to repair or replace. As one Tanglewylde resident said to me all this is being done just to waste the residents' money.

PAINTING WILL BEGIN SOON

Tanglewylde's roofing project is close to completion and now the next project will begin. It has been thirteen years since the villas were painted, and the paint is still holding up, but the colors have faded. The last paint job was tested by Sherwin William's representative who came out to see how our paint job held up over the years and he was amazed with the quality of the paint job and told me that you can see by the thickness of the paint that it was rolled and not sprayed. We have gone out to bid and we are hoping to have our original painter repaint the village.

Pasco Commissioners approve \$2 million in incentives for finance company to move to Odessa

NEW PORT RICHEY — The Pasco County Commission approved a \$2 million economic development incentive package Tuesday for Dallas-based Santander Consumer USA, an auto financing company which plans to renovate a portion of the former Target store on State Road 54 at the Suncoast Parkway.Santander is expected to create 875 new jobs here over the next five years with an average annual salary of \$46,283.In his memo recommending the package, Pasco County's economic growth manager David Engel wrote that the company is a "public, full-service consumer finance company focused on vehicle finance and third-party servicing."

The county has been working with the company for months under an agreement of confidentiality. Known during those negotiations as "Project Thunder," the company plans to renovate and occupy 115,425 square feet of the former Target store at 16400 State Road 54. The planned cost for the renovation is \$22 million, including \$9.5 million in remodeling and \$12.5 million in office furniture and equipment. The company will receive incentives for both job creation and to reimburse for tangible taxes for capital investment paid out over a 10-year period. Engel noted in his memo that the incentives for job creation were substantially lower than they would be for new construction projects, which "deliver new buildings to the county's property tax base and help market the county as a desirable destination for employers."In this case, however, the company checked many of the boxes for what the county is looking for. It is considered a "qualified targeted industry" occupying a former "big box" store that has been vacant for more than five years "in one of the county's most important high visibility economic growth and job creation corridors," Engel wrote.


Bill Cronin, president/CEO of the Pasco Economic Development Council, pointed out that the company would provide "new career pathways" for the area's Spanish-speaking residents because there will be numerous positions requiring bilingual employees.

Santander Consumer USA Holdings Inc. said in its announcement of the new location that the site at Suncoast Crossings would bring jobs "covering a variety of automotive finance, funding and account servicing functions, as well as a smaller number of back office roles.""We are excited to expand our presence in Florida a state with a favorable business environment where people are familiar with the Santander brand," said Mahesh Aditya, Santander consumer president and chief executive officer. "The Tampa Bay area is rich in talent, particularly in the customer service sector, and we look forward to offering future employees a dynamic and progressive place to grow their careers."The facility is expected to open for business by mid-2021. When complete, it will feature a state-of-the art call center, as well as modern office, training, conferencing and break room spaces for employees. Santander is the second entity to announce its plans for space in the old store building. Earlier this year, county plans confirmed that Rasmussen College will also be a future tenant at the site. The plans showed a 44,577-square-foot space for Rasmussen with a courtyard connecting to the adjacent portion of the building. Target opened at the location in 2006, but announced in late 2015 that it was closing after the holiday shopping season.

Commissioner Kathryn Starkey was so unhappy when the Target closed that she called its corporate offices, she said this use of the space is much more desirable. "I welcome you to Pasco County," Starkey said. "I thank you for choosing us." The owner of the site is 24/7 Delbary LLC, an affiliate of MVP Holdings that owns the PDQ and Glory Days Grill restaurant chains. The company purchased the property, which measures 173,000 square feet, and parking lot on 13 acres for \$4.9 million in July 2017.
